Major Giving Profile

Scott Townsley



Eleventh grade is a common time to start giving serious thought to going to college. In 1971, Scott Townsley took it a step further—wanting to embark on his first year of college in lieu of his last year of high school entirely. When he broached the topic with his guidance counselor, Miss Speer, she encouraged it and asked where he wanted to go. This simple conversation launched him on an educational trajectory that had a tremendously positive impact on his life.

Scott remembers sitting with Miss Speer for over an hour as she called various institutions in which he was interested. Moreover, he remembers that York College was the only one that agreed to consider his application. While YCP did not have a formal dual enrollment program then, they established parameters for Scott's matriculation: if he was admitted, he had to pass all of his first-year classes; otherwise, he would not graduate from high school. "That was exactly the challenge I needed at the time, though I'm not sure I recognized it," Scott recalls. He credits Miss Speer's determination, as well as YCP's Director of Admissions, Bradley Culbertson, and Registrar, Arthur Young, for helping to bring the idea to fruition.

After his transformative year at YCP, Scott went on to earn his Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from Drexel University and Juris Doctorate from Villanova University. He has more than 30 years of experience in the senior living and senior care field and has held positions as a lecturer and professor in a variety of topics in strategy, entrepreneurship, and innovation. Scott has also served on boards and as a consultant, honing and refining the innovative curiosity that had helped to propel him to YCP and onto his professional path.

In 2024, Scott and his wife, Carol, decided to honor the opportunity he had been given. He reached out to Glenn Miller, Vice President of Advancement, about supporting dual enrollment students. Their conversations led to the creation of the **Time to Move On, Time to Get Going Scholarship**—which, yes, is a Tom Petty reference—to support high schoolers taking undergraduate courses at YCP. From its inception just last year, it has already been awarded to four recipients.

York College's dual enrollment program has developed over the years. High school juniors and seniors with a 3.0 GPA who have parent/guardian and school counselor approval and can attend on-campus classes are eligible to apply. Students may earn up to six credits each semester, and popular courses range from Principles of General and Organic Chemistry to Perspectives in Literature.



York College of Pennsylvania has a mission of preparing graduates for productive and purposeful lives. When alumni like Scott bring their own vision forward, it deepens the ways in which this mission can be realized. The College is proud to serve its students and is honored when they return to enrich the Spartan experience. Dual Enrollment at YCP

About Dual Enrollment at YCP

The York College Dual Enrollment Program partners with area school districts to offer high school juniors and seniors the opportunity to earn college credit while completing their high school requirements. The program is designed to encourage a broader range of students to experience postsecondary education by allowing them to concurrently enroll in postsecondary courses and receive both secondary and postsecondary credit for the coursework—at a reduced cost to the student.

About the Scholarship

The Time to Move On, Time to Get Going Dual Enrollment Scholarship is awarded to high school juniors and seniors who are interested in earning college credit at YCP while completing their high school requirements. The scholarships are endowed through a gift from Carol and Scott Townsley in honor of Scott's high school guidance counselor (known to everyone as 'Miss Speer'), who recognized that for Scott, the best time to start college was before he finished high school. The scholarship—as well as the larger dual enrollment program—encourages a broad range of students who believe that it may be 'Time to Get Going' on their next phase of life to experience York's high-impact learning opportunities while earning college credit.

Program Story

Inspiring Innovation: Robotics and Engineering at YCDS

At York Country Day School, innovation begins early. From the moment students step into our classrooms, they're encouraged to think like engineers—asking questions, testing ideas, and finding creative solutions to real-world challenges. Our state-of-the-art Engineering and Robotics Laboratory is at the heart of this work, providing a space where curiosity and problem-solving come to life.

Even our youngest learners are budding engineers. Using bright, friendly Bee Bots, preschool and kindergarten students begin to understand coding as they program their robots' movements. The joy on their faces when their Bee Bot completes a path they've designed says it all: they are learning the power of cause and effect, logic, and persistence.

As students move into grades 1 and 2, they work with Dot and Dash robots, coding through iPad-based applications. The excitement in the room is contagious as students make their robots dance, speak, or navigate an obstacle course—seamlessly blending collaboration and creativity with math and science.

By grades 3 through 5, students work with LEGO EV3 robots, programming them through LEGO Mindstorms software to perform complex tasks. They also use CAD software to design their own creations and 3D print authentic prototypes—a tangible reminder that their ideas can take real shape. These students follow the Engineering Design Process, testing, refining, and improving with each iteration. Collaboration extends beyond the lab, weaving engineering and robotics throughout the curriculum. Whether a math class is exploring angles through robot movement or a science class is testing designs to model environmental systems, robotics becomes a lens through which students see the world.

In Middle School, those foundational skills grow into deeper expertise. Students continue using the LEGO EV3 platform, applying concepts like mechanical design, gearing, and advanced programming via project-based learning. They learn not only how to make a robot move, but why it moves—and how to make it move better.



By Upper School, robotics has become a pathway for exploration. Through a wide range of courses—*VEX Robotics I and II, Design for Assisted Technology, Python I and II*, etc.—students dive into the many branches of engineering. They explore mechanics, structures, materials, and assistive technologies, often with a community impact. Using the VEX Robotics platform, students expand into other systems as they take on independent projects that reflect their interests and career goals.

Students also represent YCDS in three competitive robotics teams: Junior FIRST LEGO League (Jr. FLL), FIRST LEGO League (FLL), and FIRST Tech Challenge (FTC). Through competition, students celebrate innovation, teamwork, perseverance, creativity, and confidence. At every level, robotics at YCDS empowers students to see themselves as problem-solvers and innovators. It's not just about coding or building—it's about preparing students to think boldly, act collaboratively, and make a meaningful impact in the world.
